
1/1891/2 RTD approval of the Union Station redevelopment

Renovation begins Monday on a project that will transform the historic structure into a mixed-used transit center seen as a "crowning touch."

The announcement of the lease approval was made by a development team called Union Station Alliance, which includes Larimer Associates, Sage Hospitality, REGen Lic and Urban Neighborhoods.

Joe Vostreis, chief operating officer at Larimer Associates, said redevelopment of the station is putting the "crowning touch" on the whole Fastracks plan and the redevelopment of the Central Platte Valley.

"Although the Union Station building is only a small part of the Central Platte Valley development, it is the soul of the whole project," said Vostreis. "Without the historic station, it doesn't have the same kind of soul. Everything starts and ends there."

The building will be closed to the public starting Saturday, and construction will begin Monday.

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Development team member Dana Crawford, president of Urban Neighborhoods, said the redeveloped station will serve as a destination both for local residents and visitors arriving from the airport via the planned rail line from

Denver International Airport.

Denver's Larimer Associates is handling the retail leasing of the station, which will feature more than 22,000 square feet of ground-floor

space divided into approximately 10 retail and restaurant outlets, a 12,000-square-foot public area, the "Great Hall" and 40,000 square feet of outdoor plaza space.

Walter Isenberg, president and chief executive of Sage Hospitality, which will operate the hotel,

of Sage Hospitality, which will operate the hotel, called the lease approval and pending construction "a great day and an exciting kickoff to the rebirth of Denver's historic Union Station.

"It think what is exciting for the citizens of Denver and Colorado is that we are taking this important and historic structure and bringing it back to life—to its original intended use as a transportation center," Isenberg said.

Bill Moshet, senior managing director of the Trammell Crow Co., who oversees the infrastructure changes such as streets, plazas and promenades in the area, said the improvements to Union Station are the "crowning achievement of the redevelopment of the Platte Valley."

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
